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CalArts Writers Showcase

The CalArts MFA Creative Writing class of 2023 is thrilled to partner with REDCAT to present this afternoon's glimpse into their wild and varied work. Audience members will get a real feel for the incredible range of experimentation that characterizes the literary endeavors of students in the Creative Writing program. This afternoon's showcase culminates this year's Next Words Reading Series, which featured three readings at venues across the Los Angeles Basin in celebration of the Class of 23 and their Next Words anthology, *Castles in the Sky*. The anthology features writing from all of this afternoon's readers and will be available for purchase at the reception following today's reading.

The writers will read in the following order:

Farah Abouzeid (she/her) is a writer from Monterey, California. She stud- ied Literature and Writing at UCSD, where her play Social Suicide, a dark comedy about an eighth grade presidential election, was produced by the Undergraduate New Play Festival. She was previously a script reader for the Berkeley Repertory Theatre and a teaching artist throughout San Di- ego. She recently completed her MFA in Creative Writing at Cal Arts, where she worked as a teaching assistant in the School of Critical Studies. Her thesis project, a poetry collection titled Dreamphone, is inspired by the underworld journey of Persephone, depicted through a mystical transfor- mation into a mermaid. Her work is deeply tied to themes of shapeshift- ing, witchcraft, the divine feminine, and girlhood. Farah is currently based in Los Angeles, where she writes poetry and fiction and works as a birth doula and tarot reader.

Yazmenne Archer is a native-born Jersey girl, who has coincidentally nev- er seen Jersey Girl. Still contending with labels, she is safe in the boxes of writer and poet. She hopes to slither her way into spoken word artist as she works toward her first spoken word album while obtaining her MFA from the California Institute of the Arts. Navigating the themes of grief and loss, self-reclamation is the ultimate object of her work. To Yaz, being an artist means to give to oneself as well as others, and her work as a writer is only the first step in that direction.

Madelaine Auble is a California-based writer with a flourish of fash- ion in her background and a grounding in film history who successfully weaponizes memoir in service of cultural criticism.

Nicholas Barner writes artificially inhuman fiction. He also creates infotechni- cal artworks, and he enjoys waxing suspicious. His writing has appeared in ergot., the Santa Barbara Literary Journal, Molotov Cocktail, the Rumpus, and a few other places. Inspired by dreamscapes, landscapes, play, and their ever-evolving explorations as a tarot reader, astrol- oger, and somatic soundwork practitioner, Ayla crafts magical art-expe- riences that encourage vulnerable confrontations and conversations with our innermost selves.

Brandon Cooper (who we've been given to understand is prone to all kinds of devilish foolishness, but is not so devilishly foolish in his diur- nal comportment as one could expect from such rapscalliony bruiting) does not own an iguana or any other reptile. He has written two novels (unpublished – sketchy, incidental things).
