#### ABOUT THE WORK

Pull up a cushion, have a cookie, get comfortable. Speak if you like, or just listen: *This Emancipation Thing* is an invitation to connect, to resurrect the second-wave feminist consciousness-raising circle in a new theatre event led by an interracial, gender-expansive ensemble. How do our relationships, our desires, our relationships with our bodies vibrate between 1968 and 2023, across generations? Whether for an hour or for six, settle into a womb of listening and care as contemporary LA-based feminists of all ages and genders intervene in the past, collapsing time in a new kind of theater experience from director Sara Lyons. With reproductive rights slipping through our fingers, what wisdom must we awaken from the activists who ushered in Roe v. Wade (1973)? What of that past must we crumble — and how will we emerge from the rubble?

*Please note:* This Emancipation Thing contains nudity, mentions of suicide, and frank discussions of sex and gender-based violence.

#### ABOUT THE ARTISTS

**Sara Lyons** is a Los Angeles-based director who seeks to explode form and politic in critically embodied, often interdisciplinary new theater and performance works. Working frequently in adaptation, social practice, and new media as well as theater, their work has been presented nationally and internationally by The Kitchen (NYC), REDCAT, Los Angeles Performance Practice, OUTsider, SFX Festival (NYC), Ensemble Studio Theatre (LA), HERE Arts Center (NYC), La MaMa Experimental Theatre Club (NYC), Edinburgh Fringe, and more.

In addition to *This Emancipation Thing*, recent projects include Sophia Cleary's *One & Only* (The Kitchen), an experiment in theater for an audience of one; Paul Outlaw's *BBC (Big Black Cockroach)*; and *BigBlackOctoberSurprise*, a Kafka-inspired live horror farce in which a white Tr\*mp-supporting woman wakes up as a "monstrous vermin" — a Black man (REDCAT 2019). Sara's ongoing project *I'm Very Into You* is an original adaptation of the published 1995 email correspondence by feminist literary legend Kathy Acker and McKenzie Wark. Called "worth keeping an eye out for" by *American Theatre* magazine, *I'm Very Into You* is an ongoing queer archival performance project engaging queer and feminist artists in communities around the country.

Sara has received residencies from Ucross Foundation, Thymele Arts (2020 Resident Artist), PAM Residencies, and Los Angeles Performance Practice/Automata LA. Sara holds an MFA in Directing from Carnegie Mellon University and is an alum of the Hemispheric Institute's EMERGENYC program for artists working at the intersection of performance and politics at NYU. They have lectured at UCLA, Sarah Lawrence College, and Cal Poly Pomona, and their critical writing has been published by ContemporaryPerformance.com and Riting.org.

**Emily Anne MacDonald** returns to REDCAT as the Scenic Designer for *This Emancipation Thing*. She designs for Opera, Theater, Concert, and Dance throughout the United States and Europe. She is the co-creator and co-owner of Mac Moc Design, LLC with design partner Cameron Jaye Mock. Together they have designed for notable companies such as the Badisches Staatstheater Karlsruhe, LA Phil, San Francisco Symphony, Teatro Nacional de São Carlos, Opera Philadelphia, Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, Bard Summerscape, Latino Theater Company, The Cleveland Orchestra, The Juilliard School, SF Opera Merola, Ojai Music Festival, The Getty Villa, Opera Omaha, and Opera San Antonio. She is Head of Scenic and Costume Design at California State University, Long Beach.

Joseph Amodei (they/them) is a new media artist, theater designer, activist, and educator. Their work seeks to make material differences with and for people at the intersection of art, emerging technology, and community. Joseph grew up in North Carolina, where they received a BFA in Studio Art from UNC-Chapel Hill. Joseph completed their MFA in Video and Media Design at Carnegie Mellon. They are an assistant professor of Media Design in Lehigh University's Department of Theater. Recent work has explored immersive archive creation + Virtual Reality, mediated storytelling amplifying the Black history of the South, gameplay + gerrymandering, the HIV/AIDS crisis + performance of queer care, and Human Centered Design + issues of health equity. | *jamodei.com*

**Lena Sands** is an award-winning costume designer for live performance, installation and film. She uses a variety of materials and methods to create bold and distinctive visuals, and collaborates with ensembles and communities to investigate bodies, histories, and the divine. At REDCAT: *Untitled Communion* (CMPG); *Why Aren't You Watching the Children?* (film); *Substrata* (CalArts Dance). Other notable costume designs include SITI company's *Bacchae* (BAM, Guthrie, Getty Villa); Pat Benetar's *Invincible: The Musical*; Four Larks' *Frankenstein* (The Wallis); Jennifer

Koh and Davóne Tines's *Everything Rises* (Royce Hall, BAM); and CMPG's *Mariology* (Mixed Blood Theater). Lena's work in devised theater is highlighted in *Creating Costumes for Devised Theatre* by Kyla Kazuschyk (Routledge, 2023). Her work was displayed in Moscow for the exhibition "Innovative Costume of the 21st Century: The Next Generation." Lena was a 2021 CTG Sherwood Award finalist. Jennifer Jonassen is a performance artist, director, choreographer, writer and clown. She is the founder and Artistic Director of Intrepid Dance Project which is based in her belief that everyone can dance. Jennifer most recently directed what is considered to be playwright Robert Patrick's last known play: *Entry & Exit* which was written for her & Intrepid specifically. She is a recent collaborator of Deufert & Plishcke at the Odyssey Theatre & Goethe Institute, and has studied at SITI Company's 2022 Finale Summer program. Jennifer's solo work has been performed at Los Angeles Performance Practice, Electric Lodge & Bootleg Theater. Other performance highlights include performing at CAP UCLA, Was Ist Das? & Boobie Trap variety shows, The Edwardian Ball & The Special Olympics. Jennifer dedicates her work to her mother Susan and her friend Mary Ellen: two second wave feminists in New York who fought tirelessly for Women's Rights.

Jack MacCarthy (he/they) is a gender-weird writer, performer, and professional queer. As a playwright, his work has been performed in ten states and three countries. As a screenwriter, they've won The Trans GNC Screenwriters Award and were an Austin Film Festival semi-finalist. As an actor, critics have called Jack "a terrific performer," "raw," "sassy," "moving," "really funny," "unapologetically candid," "fabulous," and "gifted with the power to connect with people." #### The Feminist Art Program (1970-1975): Cycles of Collectivity

#### On view through February 18, 2024

In 1970, artist Judy Chicago pioneered a feminist model for art and education with her students at Fresno State College. Chicago was invited to collaboratively expand this program by Miriam Schapiro at CalArts in 1971, where they would go on to develop radical and now-influential forms of art, pedagogy, and performance. The program began a cycle of collective activity with the contribution of numerous students, faculty, artists, and designers, many of whom are now considered pivotal artists in feminist art history. Engaging with these initial moments and drawing connections with subsequent contributions, The Feminist Art Program (1970–1975): Cycles of Collectivity brings together these histories. Gathering material from institutional and personal archives, the exhibition joins these with new responsive artworks by CalArts alumni ak jenkins, Andrea Bowers, Gala Porras-Kim, and Suzanne Lacy. The exhibition presents an ever-growing contribution to art and pedagogy through a multiplicity of voices and identities, and an intergenerational collective of scholars, artists, activists, and curators.
